### Brisbane City Council is committed to becoming a global leader in sustainable development.

Council's commitment to the United Nations 17 Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) focuses on improving residents' lives through addressing social, economic and environmental challenges, creating an open, thriving, cleaner, greener and safer future for Brisbane residents.

Council's commitment falls under the 4 themes of the VLR - Resilience; Active, Healthy and Green; Inclusive, Diverse and Equitable; Liveable and Connected - and includes key activities such as:

- green and blue infrastructure including the Green Bridges Program, Victoria Park / Barrambin and Brisbane Metro
- land purchasing through the Bushland Preservation Levy, park upgrades, waterway rehabilitation and flood engineering
- consumption reduction and recycling campaigns helping divert waste from landfill
- active transport focus including tree shading and cycling infrastructure •

### Active, Healthy and Green

Brisbane's subtropical climate lends itself to an active population enjoying healthy lifestyle opportunities. Council's commitment is to enhance the city's active status through clean and green initiatives. As Australia's most biodiverse capital city, Brisbane enjoys a diverse natural environment. Its parks, green spaces, river and waterways are key to a green city and Council's commitment is to preserve and enhance the city's natural environment.

### Resilience

For Brisbane, resilience is considered relative to economic health, community response and recovery from major disruptions such as natural disasters. Council invests in programs such as bushfire mitigation on Council assets and infrastructure, and will continue to identify opportunities to balance the equation of investment in resilience and preparedness to response and recovery.



Hanlon Park / Bur'uda is a best practice example of how Brisbane can deliver blue and green infrastructure in its urban environment. The park features a flood resilience measure via a sponge effect, filtering water flow into the city's stormwater systems and away from community infrastructure. Council's commitment to *Brisbane. Clean, Green, Sustainable 2017-2031* helps achieve climate resilience and prepares for and adapts to the impacts of climate change.

Council is focused on increasing the city's tree coverage, which enhances shade and cooling in urban environments and supports a walkable city.

City planning is key as Council adapts Brisbane to address the challenges posed by current and future climate change and realises the opportunities from proactive planning.

### Liveable and Connected

Brisbane is known for its outdoor lifestyle and economic opportunities. Access to a home and the ability to travel in and out of the city to participate in lifestyle offerings is what attracts people to Brisbane. Council aspires to providing the highest standard of connectivity across the city, connecting people with the places they love and the activities they love to experience.

The city is expected to grow, with a need to provide 210,000 additional dwellings by 2046. Ensuring all residents have access to adequate housing plays a major part in ensuring equal outcomes throughout Brisbane's communities.

Council's Sustainable Growth Strategy responds to the changing needs for housing into the future.





HOMELESS CONNECT Our Homeless Connect program has helped more than

Providing free services to people experiencing homelessness and those at risk of homelessness. The **Community Housing Partnership Project** provides temporary housing for people experiencing homelessness and those at risk of homelessness. The project utilises properties resumed or held by Council for future infrastructure works and has helped to accommodate more than 1,500 people since 2003.

The **Pathway out of Homelessness Grant Program** provides funding to not-for-profit service providers and social enterprises. The aim of the program is to bolster sector capacity, collaboration, innovation and demonstrated outcomes to achieve sustainable tenancies.

Council's **Housing Support Program** helps to fund community organisations that are responding to the needs of homeless people, or those living in social housing. The program aims to enhance support services offered to homeless and socially housed people.

**Brisbane Housing Company** is a leading provider of affordable housing in Brisbane, with 1,700 properties across the city.



Council's transport plans and strategies, including the *Transport Plan for Brisbane – Strategic Directions*, address challenges and harness opportunities to guide further development of the transport network. Projects like the Brisbane Metro will improve mobility, reduce congestion and enable opportunities for sustainable urban development throughout the city and suburbs.

### Inclusive, Diverse and Equitable

Brisbane is a multicultural and diverse city that prides itself on being a vibrant, inclusive place for everyone. Council supports hundreds of iconic creative and cultural experiences, including Brisbane Festival, Indigenous Art Program, BrisAsia Festival, Valley Fiesta and more.

More than 32% of Brisbane residents were born outside of Australia and inclusion, diversity and equity are key factors to a successful, harmonised Brisbane community.

Aboriginal cultures are the world's oldest continuing cultures and Aboriginal people are the Traditional Custodians of the lands and waters known today as Brisbane.

Council is committed to working collaboratively with Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander communities. For Brisbane, this means a greater focus on reconciliation, education and breaking barriers to cultural inclusion.

Council's Innovate *Reconciliation Action Plan (RAP)* sets a vision for reconciliation in our city, spanning from 2022-2024 as well as committed actions for sustained reconciliation outcomes.



# Brisbane's commitment to the United Nations 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development


