Practice Note: Determining the construction date of a building

Purpose

This practice note provides a checklist to assist private certifiers, consultants and development application applicants to establish the construction date of a traditional character building.

Context - Protecting Brisbane's traditional building character

To protect Brisbane's past and maintain the architectural character of our city and suburbs, *Brisbane City Plan 2014* (City Plan) provides requirements for appropriate development in Brisbane's older suburbs, and for renovating, demolishing or removing traditional character buildings.

These requirements provide for:

- buildings built before 1947 to be retained and any extensions or alterations to complement the traditional building style
- buildings built before 1911 are to be retained and extensions or alterations should not alter or remove pre-1911 parts of the building.

Establishing the construction date of a building informs what provisions required under City Plan apply to development proposals on character buildings constructed prior to 1947.

Using this practice note

This practice note provides a step by step research checklist to assist determining the construction date of a building. The checklist includes actions, tasks, useful research sources and systematic recording of evidence uncovered during the research process.

Completing the checklist will establish a record of research to determine the date of construction of a building. Completed checklists can be submitted with a development application to inform and support the proposal.

This practice note provides two checklists based on the potential construction date of a building and what relevant Traditional building overlay code provisions would subsequently apply:

- Research <u>Checklist 1 buildings substantially constructed before 1 January 1947</u>
- Research Checklist 2 buildings substantially constructed before 1 January 1911

This practice note provides general advice and guidance only. Researching a building to identify its construction date can be challenging - the type and detail of historical sources relating to a place can vary and interpreting historical information can require specialist knowledge and skills.

Research checklist 1 – Buildings substantially constructed before 1 January 1947

Establishing the construction date of a building informs what provisions and code requirements in *Brisbane City Plan 2014* apply to the redevelopment of a traditional character building. *Brisbane City Plan 2014* provisions ensure development:

- protects residential buildings substantially constructed in 1946 or earlier that individually or collectively contribute to giving the areas in the Traditional building character overlay their traditional character and traditional building character
- protects buildings substantially constructed prior to 1911 and limits their demolition, removal or removal of original parts of the building

Use this checklist to establish a record of research to determine the date of construction of a building. Completed checklists can be submitted with a development application to inform and support the proposal.
