


Brisbane at a glance

Brisbane is a great place to live, work and relax - it's a safe, vibrant, green and prosperous city, valued for its friendly and optimistic character and enjoyable lifestyle. Brisbane City Council is creating jobs while planning for the future and ensuring the city has the services and infrastructure to meet the needs of future generations.

Brisbane is the capital of Queensland and encompasses key employment districts including the Brisbane Central Business District, Australia Trade Coast (Brisbane Airport and Port of Brisbane) and the South West Industrial Gateway, which service local businesses as well as those in the broader South East Queensland.

With an estimated 863,000 jobs, a labour force of more than 759,000 and more than 136,000 registered businesses, Brisbane is an ideal place to live and do business.








Brisbane's resident population





How is Brisbane's population projected to change?






The share of Brisbane's children is projected to decrease from 18% to 14% between 2021 and 2046.



The share of Brisbane's working age population is projected to stay relatively consistent over the long run. With this section of the population projected to be 69% in 2046.





The share of Brisbane's senior population is projected to increase from 13% to 17% between 2021 and 2046. Brisbane's senior population is projected to increase an average of 2.0% per annum between 2021 and 2046.

Brisbane's labour force increased from 645,294 persons in March quarter 2013 to 759,661 persons in March quarter 2023.





Which industries employ the most workers in Brisbane?

In 2021, the top three industries in Brisbane were health care and social assistance, professional, scientific and technical services, and education and training.

These industries employed a total of 281,221 workers in 2021 accounting for 35% of total jobs within the Brisbane Local Government Area (LGA).





Professional, Scientific and Technical Services (except Computer System Design and Related Services) is estimated to experience the largest increase in the number of workers between 2018 and 2041.



How many registered businesses does Brisbane have?

The number of registered businesses within the Brisbane LGA increased by 10% between June 2017 and June 2022. In June 2017, there were 123,779 registered businesses within the Brisbane LGA increasing to 136,218 registered businesses in June 2022.




How much do Brisbane businesses turnover?

How many visitors come to Brisbane?





What are visitors' main reasons for visiting Brisbane?*


